


Ethnicity/Race

New Thresholds Offices!

After selling two office buildings with lots of unused space, Thresholds moved into the Special Olympics Michigan Center for Inclusion (SOMI) at 160 68th St SW, the site of the former South Christian High School. Our renovated office suite was completed in the spring and we celebrated with a joint Open House with our new neighbors Disability Advocates of Kent County.

Our offices are fully accessible and incorporate the principles of Universal Design. The light, open space is peaceful and welcoming, making staff and visitors feel comfortable. We love to host visitors and show them not just our suite but the entire SOMI campus, which is also home to nine other nonprofits. Please stop by for a tour!

Bobby Overcomes Challenges

The first thing you'll notice about Bobby is his beautiful, perpetual smile, and it's what you'll remember most when you hear his story.

Bobby's life was upended in 2011. For many who live with autism, change is challenging, especially changing your home environment. After caring for him for as long as she could, Bobby's mother made the difficult decision that she could no longer meet his needs. Bobby moved into a Thresholds home. His

transition was particularly rough and dangerous. Bobby frequently ran away, always heading toward a busy, nearby four-lane road. Sometimes he would become very upset and injure himself, once permanently damaging his eye. But our staff persevered, gaining his trust by showing they were not going to give up on him.

Through the relationships he built at Thresholds, Bobby adjusted and is thriving. He enjoys helping with household tasks, like retrieving the mail. Bobby's relationship with his mom also continues to be strong. He happily phones and visits her regularly.

Bobby still struggles managing his behavior, but he also continues to make progress to better control himself and be more independent. He smiles a lot now, a big grin of someone who feels safe and secure. We look forward to what the coming years have in store for Bobby!



Abby Thrives with Respite Care

Abby lives with her mom, Sally, and were it not for Sally's faithful, daily care, Abby would likely live in a group home. Abby and Sally share a special bond

which is evident when you meet them. They really enjoy each other's company! Sally ensures that Abby's life is rich and full. But like everyone, Sally needs regular breaks from the daily responsibilities of supporting Abby. This is where Thresholds' Respite program comes in, providing staff to support Abby for a few hours so the two of them can be apart.

While Sally gets a break, Abby does some fun activities with other respite participants, like bowling! Sally says this about the Threshold respite program:

"Respite is a wonderful program. It gives me time to do things I like and need to do for myself. It also gives Abby the opportunity to get out of the house and spend time with someone other than family, which is important for her too. Respite helps both of us."



Beth Dared to Make a Change

After 13 years at a big box home improvement store, Beth knew she wanted to do something more meaningful with her life but was reluctant to try a new field. Her roommate worked for Thresholds in the Individual Community Supports program and convinced her to apply. At first, Beth was afraid of such a huge change. What if she failed? What if she couldn't do the job?

Beth joined the Thresholds team in 2020, and she not only didn't fail, she excelled! She has become a beloved ICLS staff member, working well with everyone, accepting them where they are and showing she believes they can change and grow. Beth's no-nonsense, but people know they can trust her to tell them like it is.

Many years ago, she cared for her nephew, a young boy with autism who does not speak. "...and I loved it". She developed a special bond with him that clearly impacted them both. 







